Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time- Year C - 2 March 2025

Dear Parish Family,

Integrity of character is of vital importance to all disciples of Jesus. Thus the church continues to remind us of the virtues and qualities that should characterize our lives as Christians. Today's readings have many words of correction. If a blind man leads a blind man they will both fall into a pit. This question made me wonder: how many of us could lead someone to Heaven? The young St John Vianney, lost on his way to his new parish, said to a young man, "If you show me the way to Ars (his new parish), I will show you the way to Heaven." The young man responded, "How can you show me the way to Heaven? You don't even know the way to Ars". But seriously, think of this: could you show someone the way to Heaven? If you could not, how do you know you are on the right path? We may be so busy looking at others' faults that we are not correcting our own.

One line in the Gospel really called me to correction this week: Out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaks. I like this because it gave me something that I want to work on for Lent. Sure, we all have filters and we don't say certain things in front of our parents or children, but what comes out of our mouth around friends, around alcohol? That is really what is in our heart. Our gossip, our slander, our judgement, our crude jokes. Our tongues are revealing our hearts. Our first reading is a call to be very careful in evaluating people based on their appearances rather than on the wisdom that comes from them. It says: "The test of a man is in his conversation. A man's word's betrays what he feels. Do not praise him before he speaks."

Despite this, it suffices to note that one needs a lot of wisdom to discern the truth in someone's word. This is true, especially given that many people say beautiful words to please and deceive others while their hearts are far from the truth. In today's gospel, Jesus also teaches us that the quality of our heart determines the quality of our words and actions. He says, "A good person, out of the store of goodness in his heart produces good, while an evil person, out of a store of evil produces evil; for from the fullness of the heart the mouth speaks."

As Christians, if we live according to the good news, our actions and words would be guided by it. Consequently, it will affect others positively. On the contrary, if we fill our hearts with superficial things, our words and actions would be filled with nothingness. What does all this mean and how does this help us? Well, we are coming up to Lent. It is just a few days away now. In Lent we are called to death and in Easter to resurrection. What are you doing? If you are merely giving up something, why are you giving up something? It is important that we give up something that will correct our hearts. We usually work with the three areas – prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Look at what your heart does when it is weak. What does it say or do or think and use this Lent to correct it. Remember this: we might think that the people who killed Jesus were really evil, despicable people, but in truth they were the regular people of Jerusalem. You and I, and what caused them to kill Him was that they did not want to be changed by Him. Let us not be like them, but have a change of heart this Lent. **Fr Leonard**

Dear Parish Family,

One of the key disciplines during a Jubilee year **is the gaining of Jubilee Indulgences**, which is of great benefit for our spiritual life. As you are aware the Archdiocese of Hobart under the direction of Pope Francis has named four Diocesan Sacred Sites for this Jubilee year. Two in the south (**shrine of Our Lady of Victories – Lutana and St John the Evangelist – Richmond**), and two sacred sites in the north of our Archdiocese (**Our Lady of the Sacred Heart – Ross and Holy Trinity Church -Westbury**). We as a parish plan to make a pilgrimage to the Holy Trinity Church, Westbury in a few months' time. I will keep you posted on this in the next few weeks. (Please note it will be after the Lenten and Easter season). This week I would like you to reflect on how to gain Jubilee indulgences. (page 3 and flyer)

The conditions in number 2 can be fulfilled a few days before or after performing the works below to gain the indulgence, but it is appropriate that Communion and the prayer take place on the same day that the work is completed.

Complete one of the following six works:



Undertake a pious pilgrimage to one of the Diocesan Sacred Sites and completing one of the following:

- devoutly participating in Holy Mass or the Anointing of the Sick
- a celebration of the Word of God;
- the Liturgy of the Hours
- the Way of the Cross;
- the Marian Rosary;
- a penitential celebration, which ends with the individual confessions of the penitents.



Carry out a corporal or spiritual work of mercy



Carry out a work of Penance

Such as abstaining, fasting, donating money to the poor, by supporting works of a religious or social nature, especially in support of the defence, protection and quality of life in all its phases, or by volunteering free time to activities that are of service to the community.



By devoutly visiting one of the Diocesan Sacred Sites

For a suitable period of time, engage in Eucharistic adoration and meditation, concluding with the Our Father, the Apostles Creed, and the Hail Mary.



Participate in Missions, Spiritual Exercises or formation activities.

with a devout spirit, on the documents of the Second Vatican Council and the Catechism of the Catholic Church, held in a church or other suitable place.



Those who are sick or cannot participate for serious reasons, can obtain the Jubilee Indulgence

If, united in spirit with the faithful taking part in person, they recite the Our Father, the Apostles Creed and the Jubilee Prayer, offering up their sufferings or the hardships of their lives.

FIRST READING

Sirach 27:4-7

In a shaken sieve the rubbish is left behind, so too the defects of a man appear in his talk. The kiln tests the work of the potter, the test of a man is in his conversation. The orchard where the tree grows is judged on the quality of its fruit, similarly a man's words betray what he feels. Do not praise a man before he has spoken, since this is the test of men.

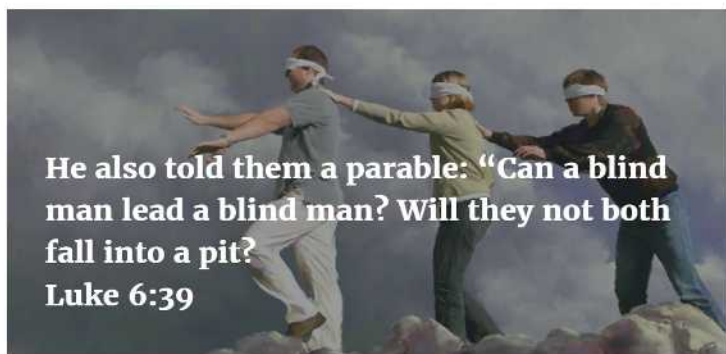
