FIRST READING

Jeremiah 20:7-9

You have seduced me, Lord, and I have let myself be seduced; you have overpowered me: you were the stronger. I am a daily laughing-stock, everybody's butt. Each time I speak the word, I have to howl and proclaim: 'Violence and ruin!' The word of the Lord has meant for me insult, derision, all day long. I used to say, I will not think about him, I will not speak in his name any more. Then there seemed to be a fire burning in my heart, im prisoned in my bones. The effort to restrain it wearied me, I could not bear it.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM Ps 62:2-6. 8-9. R. v.2

(R.) My soul is thirsting for you, O Lord my God.

- O God, you are my God, for you I long; for you my soul is thirsting. My body pines for you like a dry, weary land without water. (R.)
- So I gaze on you in the sanctuary to see your strength and your glory. For your love is better than life, my lips will speak your praise. (R.)
- So I will bless you all my life, in your name I will lift up my hands. My soul shall be filled as with a banquet, my mouth shall praise you with joy. (R.)

SECOND READING

Romans 12:1-2

Think of God's mercy, my brothers, and worship him, I beg you, in a way that is worthy of thinking beings, by offering your living bodies as a holy sacrifice, truly pleasing to God. Do not model yourselves on the behaviour of the world around you, but let your behaviour change, modelled by your new mind. This is the only way to discover the will of God and know what is good, what it is that God wants, what is the perfect thing to do.

GOSPEL

Matthew 16:21-27

Jesus began to make it clear to his disciples that he was destined to go to Jerusalem and suffer grievously at the hands of the elders and chief priests and scribes, to be put to death and to be raised up on the third day. Then, taking him aside, Peter started to remonstrate with him. 'Heaven preserve you, Lord,' he said. 'This must not happen to you.' But he turned and said to Peter, 'Get behind me, Satan! You are an obstacle in my path, because the way you think is not God's way but man's.' Then Jesus said to his disciples, 'If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me. For anyone who wants to save his life will lose it; but anyone who loses his life for my sake will find it. What, then, will a man gain if he wins the whole world and ruins his life? Or what has a man to offer in exchange for his life? 'For the Son of Man is going to come in the glory of his Father with his angels, and, when he does, he will reward each one according to his behaviour.'

Dear Parish family,

In last week's Gospel, Peter proclaims Jesus as "the Christ, the Son of the living God"; and Jesus recognises in him the faith on which to build his church. But in today's Gospel, Jesus brands him "Satan" telling him to get behind him. Why the dramatic change?

After hearing from Jesus the destiny that awaits him, involving suffering and death, Peter tries to talk Jesus into doing what he can to avoid the horrible future that awaits him. What's wrong with that, you may wonder? Surely, it's natural for us to take steps to avoid a future that involves pain, suffering, and death for ourselves and those we love.

Peter, however, misses the point of Jesus' mission – which will eventually result in new life. The passion and death he is to endure is necessary for the redemption of humanity and it is only through the embracing of his cross that he will triumph in the Resurrection.

We all have our crosses in life: some that may be the consequences of choices we have made earlier on in life, others that may be due to the actions of others, and still others that we are faced with, simply due to circumstances we find ourselves in.

To take on the Christian life involves embracing the cross before us, and as we share the crosses of others, we know that Jesus shares our cross too. As we enter into suffering and death with Jesus, we are sustained by the hope that we will rise with him at the end.
