

Jesus went to his home town and his disciples accompanied him. With the coming of the sabbath he began teaching in the synagogue and most of them were astonished when they heard him. They said, 'Where did the man get all this? What is this wisdom that has been granted him, and these miracles that are worked through him? This is the carpenter, surely, the son of Mary, the brother of James and Joset and Jude and Simon? His sisters, too, are they not here with us?' And they would not accept him. And Jesus said to them, 'A prophet is only despised in his own country among his own relations and in his own house'; and he could work no miracle there, though

#### Dear Parish Family,

Some thoughts for your reflection; the expression 'familiarity breeds contempt' is as old as the hills. We find it in works ranging from Aesop's fable of 'The fox and the lion', to the tale of Melibee in the Canterbury Tales, where Chaucer says, over-greet hoomlynesse (or familiarity) engendreth dispreisynge (engenders contempt). We all know from experience what the reality of this expression can mean in our lives. We get used to people and assume we know them. We take them for granted and can be blind to their good qualities. We become dismissive and are quick to find fault. We lose a sense of wonder.

In today's gospel we hear of Jesus' return to his home village after a period of preaching and working miracles around Galilee. No doubt news of his activities found its way back to Nazareth and on the Sabbath he is invited to teach in the local synagogue. Initially the people are astonished and they recognize in Jesus something out of the ordinary. Where did this man get all this, they ask, his wisdom and his power to work mighty deeds? We don't know what Jesus said but the initial astonishment quickly sours and gives way to hostility and rejection. Who does he think he is? We know him. He grew up among us. He is just the local carpenter. We know his family. He is no different from us. How mistaken they are! Yes, familiarity breeds not just contempt but unbelief. Jesus says as much when he tells them, 'a prophet is not



without honour except in his native place and among his own kin and in his own house.' And he is taken aback at their lack of faith.

Today's gospel suggest that a great obstacle to faith is familiarity, hoomlynesse: a refusal to believe that God's presence could possibly come to us in so familiar a form as the person next door; a resistance to recognise that God might have sent us a prophet in someone who, to our eyes, does not quite fit the bill. We can be like the locals of Nazareth who had fixed ideas as to when and where and how the Messiah should come to Israel. The local carpenter, the son of Mary, did not measure up. And they really missed out.

## PRAYER FOR SPIRITUAL COMMUNION

My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. AMEN.

This Sunday I would like to bring your attention the importance of singing during the Mass, with a focus on the directives on liturgy by Vatican II. As we started to focus from last Sunday on an intellectual conscious effort of Divine Liturgy from being mere spectators to active and prayerful praying of the Mass.

#### Singing the Mass

When congregational singing became a part of liturgical celebrations after Vatican II, there was a tendency to fall into a 4-hymn syndrome, singing the entrance, offertory, Communion and recessional hymns – and nothing else!

The nature of the liturgy, however, calls for a variety of music forms. The Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy (Sacrosanctum Concilium) suggests priorities for the assembly: "To promote active participation, the people should be encouraged to take part by means of acclamations, responses, psalmody, antiphons and song..." (SC30). The General Instruction on the Roman Missal says that: "In choosing the parts to be sung, preference should be given to those that are more significant and especially to those to be sung by the priest or by the priest and people together." (GIRM40) This indicates clearly that acclamations have priority when it comes to deciding what parts of the Mass to sing.

There are four acclamations which should be sung at Mass, even if there is no other singing. We stand and sing the Gospel Acclamation in anticipation of the Good News of Christ. Then during the Eucharistic Prayer, three acclamations allow the people's active participation – the Holy, Holy (Sanctus), the Memorial Acclamation and the Great Amen. The acclamations share the number-one spot because they are all fundamentally acts of praise and worship.

By contributing to the singing of these acclamations, we, as the worshipping assembly, are offering our highest praise to God. Be it acclamations, antiphons or song, let us join in with fervour. Let us increasingly put into practice that as parishioners of the Launceston Catholic Parish, we 'sing the Mass' rather than 'sing at Mass', to the praise and glory of God.


