This week students are transitioning into summer uniform wearing either winter or summer uniform. All students will need to be wearing the correct summer uniform for the first week of Term 4.

<u>Class / Teacher Allocations 2014:</u>

We are starting to look at class teacher allocations for next year. Whilst there is still some work to do it is important that parents, *if they have any queries or requests that they do so in writing to me*. It is also important to make sure that parents do not assume that the current teachers of a grade will be on the same grade in 2014. As stated last year just because a request is made does not guarantee that it can be accommodated. There are many elements that we spend time on in getting balanced and equitable classes. **The timeline for any written requests will be Friday 8th November**. This will then allow teachers and the school an appropriate amount of time to allocate students to classes.

From the Principal: (cont.)

Positive Behaviour Support (P.B.S.):

Today your child will bring home, in paper form, a newsletter around Positive Behaviour Support. The newsletter is a reminder of all the things we have focused on over 2012 and 2013. Through staff, Board and parent survey feedback last year it was clear that focusing on positive behaviour approaches (recognising the many good choices that many of our students do regularly) was needed. This approach celebrates and recognises what our students do well, not what some of our students do not do well some of the time.

I really encourage parents, also, to be prepared that across the remainder of the year your child may come home having had their name on Think Carefully or Consequence. They may have used inappropriate language and had a consequence for this. This does not mean that their behaviour or the overall behaviour standards of the students are dropping. In fact the opposite! We are getting better at sharpening our focus on more specific behaviours and raising our standards higher because we know our great students can do it! We are now identifying and acting on more of these behaviours than we have done in the past. At the start of next year we will be formally launching PBS within our school. The 3 main messages will be:

RESPECT OURSELVES
 RESPECT OTHERS
 RESPECT OUR LEARNING

Communication:

I also really encourage parents if they have any concerns or queries to communicate through the right channels first. Usually this is the class teacher. A note, an email, face to face or a phone call (during work day hours to be fair to the teacher) are all appropriate approaches. If you are not ok with the outcome of this or need to direct it further you can then speak with myself or a leadership team member. Even then, if you are unhappy with this, you can direct your concerns to the next step in the chain. The school can provide you with the contact details of this if needed.

At the same time there are some things that are whole school related that you would go straight to me or a member of the leadership team about rather than direct them to a teacher - as it relates to the leadership or management of the school.

The extensive survey feedback last year identified communication and Positive Behaviour support as the two key areas we needed to focus on the most. We have been doing a lot of work in this area. I am really proud of the improvements that we have made, whilst acknowledging that there is still room for growth.

Wednesday, 13th November


Wear Old Fashioned Clothes ...


